Introduction

Welcome to the third annual prayer guide for Judson College! This journal is the work of many Judson sisters (over 30!) who believe in the power and importance of prayer for effecting change in the world and in individual lives. Alumnae from eight decades (40s, 50s, 60s, 70s, 80s, 90s, 00s, and 10s!) contributed to this collection of devotions, prayers, and profiles. And, just like last year, we were struck by the similarities in Judson experiences across the years and the shared commitments to God, family, and our beloved college. As we noted last year, Judson is a special place that has touched many lives. It is our desire that this guide will further the mission of our esteemed alma mater in the world.

In this year's prayer guide, you'll find all the things you've come to expect in its short, two-year existence – introductions to alumnae and current students, prayers for our college and its constituents, and reflections on passages of scripture. But, this year, there's a new little twist. Since we Judson girls like to sing on special occasions, we turned to the songbook of the Bible for inspiration. Each week (with the exception of one) features a Psalm that was sung to communicate the common experiences of a community, much like our treasured step-sing and senior songs formed us. By turning to this ancient songbook, we hope to give words to our prayers and to recount the appropriateness and sometimes the necessity of song to convey our emotions and desires. These Psalms, and our songs, make up our common story.

We hope that you will join us in praying for Judson College during the twelve weeks from the week after Christian Emphasis Week to J-Day 2013. Each week has a specific prayer focus and plenty of thoughts for further meditation. Our prayer for this guide is that it will not only draw us closer to the God we serve, but that it will renew our commitment to Christian higher education as one way we can be the hands and feet of Jesus in a hurting world.

"I". "I" is only a one letter word, yet it means so much. "I" defines each and every one of us and we use it all the time. Here are some examples you might find familiar. "I" want a chocolate covered ice cream cone from Dairy Queen. "I" like the beach when the sun is shining and there is a slight breeze to keep me cool so that "I" don't sweat when "I" layout. "I" need those new heels because "I" don't have them in that shade of that color. Surely by now you are getting the point about the word "I". There is absolutely nothing wrong with this word, however if we don't watch out, we can let our own "I" consume us. Our "I" can become so big that we forget to look beyond ourselves to the needs of those around us. Or we see those who are in need and think "I" don't know what to do or how to help. This is when we let our "I" get in the way.

While serving as a missionary in Central Asia, there was one specific time that I remember letting my "I" get in the way. One night, my friends and I were walking through a market. The sidewalks were about as crowded as a McDonalds French fry box. Suddenly, the crowd broke a little to my right and I saw a man sitting on the ground. He had no legs below the knee and one of his arms was gone below the elbow. He also appeared to be blind. In front of him was a small bucket for people to drop money. Feeling somewhat shocked by the scene, I tried to get by the man as quickly as I could so I could pretend I didn't see him. "I" felt so helpless. "I" could not take the man home, or even talk to him for that matter, because he did not know English. As I walked past him, I noticed my friend Jonna behind me. She knelt down beside the man. I stopped. She then reached for his hand and put her other hand on his back. At this point, she began to weep, and so did the man. She stayed there with the man for about five minutes and said a prayer with him. I just stood and watched. I was amazed and my eyes were full of tears. She just touched him. She knelt down beside him, just as Christ came down to earth to touch the lives of the hurting. Jonna didn't let her "I" get in the way.

In Psalm 41, David writes, "Blessed is the one who considers the poor! In the day of trouble the Lord delivers him; the Lord protects him and keeps him alive; he is called blessed in the land." As servants of Christ, we are called to deny our "I" and look to the needs of others. This doesn't always mean moving overseas or becoming a minister, but rather opening our eyes and meeting people where they are in life.

For me, this idea of meeting people where they are is at the heart of Judson's mission. During my time as a student and then as a Judson staff member, I was part of organizing and planning events in the early days of the Faith-Based Service and Learning program. Since that time, I've watched as the College has discovered more opportunities to be the hands of Christ in Perry County. God used my experiences at Judson to begin molding my heart to serve those who are less fortunate for a lifetime.

A blank page stares at me...where do I begin to testify to the truth of God's Word in Psalm 121? It seems just yesterday that I sat between my parents in the front seat of our car which was loaded literally to the roof with all of my "worldly" possessions. We arrived on the campus of Judson College on a hot, sultry August morning and I began the most important, life-changing journey of my life. The three years spent at JC certainly prepared me educationally for my future, but in honesty, the most valuable preparation was not in the classroom. Instead, it was the leadership roles, extra-curricular activities, and the one-on-one relationships with faculty, staff and classmates which prepared me most for my future. Forever friendships were formed during those years which continue to this day to be priceless treasures. Little did I know as I moved my tassel on our Graduation Day, that the journey ahead of me would be filled with ordinary days of continued learning, unbelievable joys and occasionally, indescribable heart-aches.

My life has not been extraordinary. I have not found the cure for cancer, healed the sick, taught hundreds of students in a classroom, gone to a foreign land to share the Gospel, or written a best-selling book, nor have I designed the interior of a fabulous work-space or home as you would assume from my degree. BUT my life has been far from ordinary because my precious Savior has been my Protector, my Comforter, my Provider, and my Guide each step along the way. Just as He promised Abraham in Genesis 12:2, "I will bless you", He has blessed my life – so often teaching me from my mistakes, inspiring me to love those who are different from me, leading me to have a grateful heart and to recognize His abundance. I have often claimed the verses of Romans 8:26-27: "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weaknesses. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will." It is my testimony on this page today that the Spirit has interceded on my behalf far more often than I can count or deserve, and because of His intercession, "I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God, that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8: 38-39) This is the testimony which makes my ordinary life truly extraordinary and gives me great confidence to lift up my eyes to the hills!

Confession time: I fret. I'm a fretful fretter who frets fretfully over all sorts of things I can't control - especially other people's actions and their consequences in my life. In Psalm 37 I discovered a solid rebuke for this ostensibly modest trespass, followed by reassurance that our marvelously watchful God has the futures of His faithful followers and of their enemies well in hand.

With all of the evils and wickedness I see in the world around me on a daily basis and in the nightly news, it's pretty easy to find things to worry over. In comparison to many of those shocking acts of depravity and mayhem, worrying and fretting seem fairly minor, right? After all, who am I hurting other than myself? Yet the passage reminds me that fretting "leads only to evil," that I am to "trust in the Lord and do good" and that He will therefore give me the desire of my heart.

So if I'm not fixated on the appropriate consequences for people who wrong me and those who go around sinning against the Lord and His people willy-nilly, who's going to handle the situation? According to this passage, that would be God. He laughs at the wicked. Even if they seem to be prospering like weeds in a flower bed, choking out the pansies, it won't be long before He breaks out the Roundup. The wicked will perish. Wrongdoers will be completely destroyed.

On the other hand, the Lord loves the righteous. He upholds those who keep His word in their hearts even when they stumble. As I love and honor Him, I should endeavor to refrain from anger, turn from wrath, and resist the urge to fret. How much happier will I be if I focus on delighting in my amazing Provider and Protector instead of homing in on all of the negativity and fallout of a fallen world? It can often be difficult in light of large-scale tragedies or even personal setbacks, but I know that I can trust in the Lord. If I wait on His perfect plan, I shall see the meek inherit the Earth.

Father in Heaven, thank you for the reminder that the salvation of the righteous comes from you, and that you are their stronghold in time of trouble. I pray that you will continue to guard and guide each sweet and precious sister who has passed through Judson's doors, making firm their steps and upholding them with your hand as they delight in you. Walking through the front doors of Jewett Hall, one of the first things we notice is the large collegiate seal on the floor which reads, "LUX ET VERITAS." Light and truth are the principles that Judson College seeks to impart to young women in entering this institution of higher education. With the quest for light and truth is also a quest for wisdom.

Psalm 111 offers us key insights into not only how we acquire wisdom but what our response should be once we have made the discovery.

Looking reversely in this passage, we see that wisdom – that is knowing how to appropriately apply what we know – begins with reverence before an almighty God.

Reflecting on verses two through nine we see why God deserves respect and awe. This passage reveals how the works of God are an overflow of the very character of the God. Some adjectives used in various biblical translations are honorable, majestic, gracious, loving, truthful, merciful, faithful, awesome and generous. Such magnificent words set the stage for a Judge and King that is almost beyond human comprehension. And yet that same eternal God came near through His son, Jesus Christ. He chose you. He chose me. He wants to be in a very personal relationship with each of us.

Once we come to this realization of who He is and are reminded of what He has done for His children, we are moved to praise with our whole hearts as described in verse one of Psalm 111. For what other response does one have for One so worthy but to embrace Him with our worship?

So in your quest for wisdom in the biology lab, the stables, in choir, on the basketball court or softball field, in math class, in composing that English essay or studying for that history midterm, remember that the source of all wisdom and understanding comes from living out the principles in God's Word that bring glory to Him.

No matter what facet of your life you are engaging in as a student – be it relational, academic or extracurricular – seek wisdom from God in each of these areas and let your voice overflow with praise to the One who is worthy of all that we are and all that we have. As a student at Judson College in the late 1970s and early 1980s, I was living in my own little perfect world on a small Christian campus surrounded by friends of similar values and a wealth of Christian mentors who were not only outstanding in their professional fields, but also were sincerely devoted to their calling in Christian education. During those most formative years of my character and my education, I never imagined what the 21st Century might bring. I had no idea that our nation and world would have experienced the trying times that have occurred during the final years of the 20th Century and these first 12 years of the 21st Century, including war, bombings, terrorist attacks, economic hardship, mass shootings, and natural disasters. During the dark times of tragedy and turmoil, it has been important for me to remember from whence cometh the light to help see me through – "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path" (Psalm 119:105, KJV).

Humans frequently try to blame or question God for the tragedies that occur in our lives. Some may ask, "How could a loving God allow such things to happen?" With Adam and Eve sin was brought into the world. The devil is definitely at work in our world, trying his best to win control. The Psalmist wrote, "The wicked have laid a snare for me, but I do not stray from your precepts" (Psalm 119: 110, ESV). God does not promise to prevent us from experiencing trying or even tragic times. God does, however, promise to never leave us and to guide and sustain us through such times. "Your testimonies are my heritage forever, for they are the joy of my heart" (Psalm 119: 111, ESV).

It is easy to praise God and trust His Word during the good times. It is during the trying times of turmoil and tragedy that it is most important for us to adhere to God's Word and to trust that He will bring us through if we cling to Him. It is also important for us to continually pray for our leaders – local, state, national, and international. We must also continually pray for our dear Mother Judson and those entrusted to lead, preserve, and carryout her mission of providing a Christian education for young women. We must pray that Judson will always be a "beacon on a hilltop shining brightly through the night" providing "light and truth" for young women for generations to come.

I remember several times in my life when I've prayed so fervently for God to instruct me in the way I should choose. "God, which college should I attend?" "Should I work or take classes in the summer?" "Is 8:00 really the best time to take English Grammar 400?" Often, I felt like my fervent prayers for guidance were answered with silence. Thirteen months ago, though, my husband and I began to consider adopting a child. This time, things were different. We felt affirmation and guidance from God every step of the way. I remember one particularly frustrating day when someone had scratched out something on a form that wasn't supposed to be scratched out. I worried that, if our paperwork wasn't done perfectly, we would be booted out of the system and lose any chance of adopting. In that moment, I got the clearest message from God I have ever received; basically, "You do the best you can with that paperwork out of obedience to Me, and whether or not you actually have a child at the end is up to Me."

I wonder why seeking God's will sometimes seems so fruitless but is sometimes so rewarding. I think David, in verse 12, gives us the key. "Who is the man who fears the Lord?" That's the guy who is seeking after God and finding Him. While God is interested in our daily decisions and life choices, His biggest interest for us is to fear Him.

I've been a Christian for most of my life, but, at 30, I have finally understood what it means to fear God. Fear of God comes from knowledge of Him, and knowledge of Him comes only through the Gospel. I am a sinner, and have been since birth. I am dirty and foul, unable to enter God's presence, and therefore doomed to life without God. God, in His infinite wisdom and love, is aware of my problem, and has provided the perfect solution. Since my sin problem keeps me from entering His presence, Jesus came to Earth. He lived a perfect life in order to give me an example to follow, and then died a horrific death, to take my punishment for my sin. He conquered death, and returned to Heaven, leaving His Holy Spirit to draw us unto Himself and guide His children in the way of righteousness. This beautiful plan, which has rightly been called foolishness to the perishing, is the knowledge of God. Our fear of God takes us to the cross, where we find salvation and reconciliation with God, and our fear of God guides us to make decisions that bring glory to His Name.

Know, dear sister, when you are seeking God's will and finding silence, that your right standing with God comes, not from always making the right decisions, but by being in Christ.

Oh Great God, we pray, like Paul, that we may be filled with the knowledge of Your Will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of You, fully pleasing to You, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in knowledge and fear of You. We pray for our faculty and administration, that they may be strengthened with all power, according to Your glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy. We thank You and praise You that Jesus, in whom we have redemption and the forgiveness of sins, has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to Your kingdom (Col. 1:9-14). All this we pray in the name of Jesus our Savior. Amen.

I was truly blessed to be born into a family with a heritage of Christ-like servanthood. While in no way have my parents or grandparents performed miracles, but they have been a conduit for showing Christ's love to many people during my childhood years, and even today. The examples are endless. I saw my dad cut many loads of firewood and deliver to families in need of warmth. I saw my mother carry impoverished children to a store to buy new clothes. I saw my grandma deliver food to those who were sick or who had lost a loved one to death. I've heard stories of how my great grandmother faithfully washed the feet of fellow church members. Each of these acts of service were committed not out of selfish ambition, but out of the blessings bestowed by God and out of a desire to bring praise to His name, ironically, by being a servant.

When I read Psalm 113, I am aware that the psalmist sought to bring praise to God's name. He certainly recognized God's eternal and universal sovereignty. God is rightfully due our praise. Little did the psalmist know that hundreds of years in the future, a humble, servant-girl, would deliver almighty God to earth in human form. The God Man stooped to earth and lived among the poorest. He discussed with the religious elite yet dined in the home of sinners. He be-friended and taught a group of simple tradesmen who would become known as his disciples. He healed the sick. He restored life, both physical and spiritual. The latter verses in Psalm 113 describe how God, through Christ, stooped down to be a servant to us.

So, what does this foreshadowing of Christ's servanthood and the examples of servanthood I witnessed in my family mean for me? I am very aware of my blessing to be born into a family that praised God and exemplified a servant lifestyle. With this awareness also comes an obligation to carry-on the servant lifestyle. This Psalm deals with the two paths that each of us must ultimately make a choice on which to travel – the path of ungodliness or the path of righteousness. Verse one speaks of a progression in regard to the former path – walking in the counsel of the ungodly, standing in the path of sinners, and then sitting in the seat of the scornful. Every day we are confronted with choices that have the potential to result in sin. If the wrong choice is made we begin that dreadful walk toward ungodliness. If we do not turn around and take the right path, or repent, we can grow more and more comfortable on the path of ungodliness until we stop walking and stand in a life of sin. Finally, we will rest, or sit, in a life that is not only sinful but that disdains God.

Verse two speaks of the latter path, the path of righteousness that is found in adherence to God's Word. This adherence is not from begrudging obligation, but out of delight in the Creator and His precepts. Psalm 119 tells us that the Word cleanses our way, revives us, lights our path, gives great peace, directs our steps, and delivers us. Jesus said in John 14 that keeping His commandments is an indicator of our love for Him. How I love to ask God for blessings for Judson! But what exactly do I expect God to do when I ask Him to shine His face upon our college? My list can be compiled quickly. Over the past few years more than 30 students have participated in mission activities from Perry County to New York City, as well as in foreign countries in Asia and Africa. How blessed we all have been through our association with this institution that remains so faithful to its legacy of commitment to God and service to His people.

EXTRA DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT FOR ENTERING THE SUMMER: Scrípture: Psalm 33

"The eyes of the Lord are on those who fear Him, on those whose hope is in His unfailing love." Psalm 33:18

Psalm 33 opens with a call to praise- the reason: "for the word of the Lord is right and true. He is faithful in all He does. By His word the Heavens were made and the starry hosts by the breath of His mouth." Psalm 33:4.

God's word is never failing, never ending, never returns to Him void, and always accomplishes whatever He sends it to do. We can trust God to do whatever He says, whatever He promises.

Why then do we worry so much over everything?

Jesus Himself tells us that we should not worry for God sees our every need. Paul tells us not to worry about anything, but to pray about everything, tell God all of our needs and thank Him for His answers.
